## Book Sale on Saturday Jan. 11



A freshly set up book sale room awaits its fate the evening before the November 16 sale at the Plymouth Library. The November sale raised a record-breaking \$8,351 for the library.

Another big Plymouth Library book sale is coming on January 11! The Friends of the Plymouth Library will be selling hundreds and hundreds of adult and kid's books, puzzles, DVDs, CDs.

Books range in price from 50¢ to just \$2. From 2–3 PM, you can fill entire bags with books for \$5 per bag! Proceeds benefit the Plymouth Library and Friends programs and events.

### Sale Hours:

- 9–10 AM - Exclusive early access for Friends members (join at the door for just \$10 for an annual membership)
- 10 AM–3 PM - Open to the general public
- 2–3 PM - Fill entire shopping bags with books for just \$5 per bag!

# 2024 Recap: Growth Powered by People

As we turn the page to a new year, the Friends of the Plymouth Library can now reflect on 2024 and our incredible year of growth, powered by all of you: our members, our volunteers, our social media followers, our Board of Directors, and, of course, our beloved Plymouth Library staff.

Here's a look back at what we achieved together in 2024:

- Our membership grew to 576 members—the largest of the HCL local Friends groups—and our volunteer list now includes 367 individuals who contributed over 1,700 hours in 2024.
- Each of our four book sales in 2024 broke records, and together raised a total of \$29,116. These four sales were powered by 94 volunteers, who filled 538 volunteer slots throughout the year. (Special shoutout to Board Member Sandy Hoglund, who alone filled 42 of those slots!)
- Our book sales caught the attention of local media, with five vibrant features in the Sun Sailor newspaper, including a front-page story ahead of our record-breaking September sale.
- The November sale boasted our largest-ever physical setup. Thanks to feedback from our community, we worked with the library to expand beyond our usual space, making shopping more comfortable.
- Our experiments with Facebook ads spun up a flywheel of attention to our book sales and built up enough organic traffic that we stopped paying for ads for the past two sales and still get amazing numbers. Our January book sale Facebook event has already amassed over 3,100 people interested in the event.
- We ended the year with 1,078 Facebook followers, almost doubling our followers in just one year.

All of this momentum will be put to good use in 2025, with six sales scheduled this year! (That also means six newsletters. Buckle up.) With all of your support and energy, we're poised for another remarkable year.

# Treasurer's 2024 Year In Review

The Friends of the Plymouth Library continued our successful fundraising efforts in 2024. Our four book sales (February, May, September, and November) brought in the largest portion of our annual income in the amount of \$29,116, making 2024 the most successful year for book sales in the past 12 years.

A second source of income is donations received from the Ready Reads carts of used books in the library lobby. We received \$5,560 from this source. We also received \$2,875 from membership dues. In addition, we received \$6,357 from other donations, which includes \$5,350 from Give to the Max 2024.

We sent grants of \$34,350 to the Friends of Hennepin County Library to help support the collection, outreach and engagement, career development, and student success initiatives for the 41 Hennepin County libraries.

The Friends of the Plymouth Library \$25,000 endowment fund that was set up in November 2022 had a value of \$30,853 at the end of third quarter 2024. (Year-end 2024 value will be reported in a future newsletter). This endowment is designated for the collection. The first appropriation will occur in the first quarter of 2026.

Thank you to the many members of the Friends of the Plymouth Library for your generous contributions of book donations, monetary donations, membership dues, and volunteer hours in 2024. All of these contributed significantly to our financial successes this year!

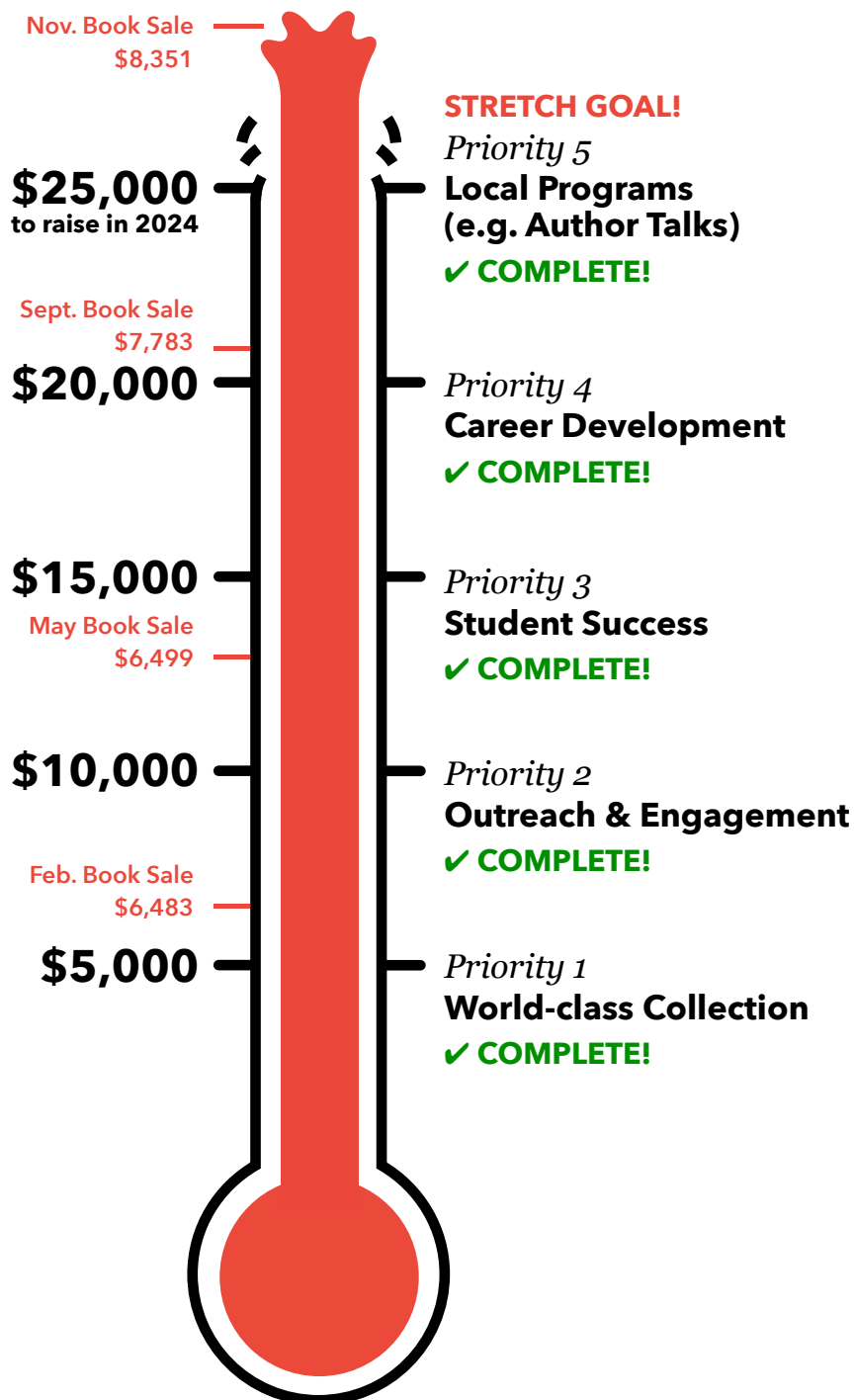

# 2024 Fundraising Goals Final Report



The Friends of the Plymouth Library successfully achieved (and far exceeded!) our 2025 fundraising goal of \$20,000 *and* our additional \$5,000 stretch goal in support of the Hennepin County Library.

# Did You Know?

## Don't Put That Book Back!

Did you read a book at the library and didn't need to take it home? **Resist the urge to put it back on the shelf.** (We know you mean well.)

Just place the book on the carts around the library so the staff can scan them into their system. The library staff have started tallying "in-house" book use in order to better support collection building.

## Need a Reading Recommendation?

The Ask Us service can provide book suggestions based on a simple questionnaire to share your preferences. The Ask Us team then uses a variety of tools, such as Novelist, a book search database. They consider factors like pace, characters, and tone. They browse summaries, reviews, and awards. In the end, 3-5 suggestions are sent your way.
