Plymouth Library 2024 Q1 Statistics

The Plymouth Library continues its monthly streak of being #1 in the system for checkouts, consistently surpassing 40,000 checkouts per month in the first quarter of 2024. Plymouth is also seeing around 300 library card sign-ups per month. We continue to be so impressed by our Plymouth Library staff and community!

2024 Year-to-date Financial Update

In the first four months of 2024, we received income of slightly more than \$9,000. The two largest income sources were our February book sale in the amount of \$6,483, our largest sale in over ten years, and \$1,400 of donations received from the Ready Reads cart of used books in the library lobby.

In March we sent a \$5,000 grant to the Friends of Hennepin County Library to be used for the collection.



2024 Fundraising Goals



FOPL's Third Year at **Discover Plymouth**

The Friends of the Plymouth Library proudly marked our third year in a row participating in Discover Plymouth, an annual expo of Plymouthbased non-profits, community groups, city services, and local businesses. The Plymouth Community Center's fieldhouse hosted 106 exhibitors this year, up from last year's 88, which provides a strong indicator of the event's year-over-year success.

Each year, we bring back lessons learned from our participation in Discover Plymouth and iterate on how we plan our participation in the subsequent year. Our primary lesson from last year: it's hard to share a 10'x10' space between ourselves and our Plymouth Library staff representative. Fortunately, the fix was simple: pay for two neighboring booths! We were thrilled to see Plymouth librarian Angela Langeberg return for her second year representing the library, and this time our two booths gave us room to spread out and have double the exposure.

We repeated our main promotional tool which has spanned our three years participating in Discover Plymouth: free books! For the second year in a row, we gave away free kids books to families visiting our booth. And we made sure they all knew they could find books just like these at our wonderful used book sales. This giveaway was a huge draw and we were able to give away hundreds of pieces of promotional materials. Here were our metrics for the day:

- Welcomed 326 visitors of all ages to our booth!
- Collected \$25 in donations
- Gave away 85 book lovers' stickers
- Handed out 112 free book vouchers for the May book sale
- Distributed 130 Plymouth READS flyers, 133 FOPL brochures, and 143 book sale bookmarks

Gave away 220 free kids' books! None of this would have been possible without our amazing booth volunteers: Barb Marshall, Brian Wilkerson, Carrie Almaer, Shritha Devaraju, Josh Velasquez, Ava Velasquez, and a special appearance by our treasurer Bernadeen Brutlag at the end of the day to collect our cash donations!














Garden Tour Bids Farewell


Career Counseling and Job Search Assistance




